The SWP has experienced a significant and growing decline in operational reliability that has directly impacted DWR’s ability to store and move water, produce electricity, and export water from the Delta when the appropriate hydrological conditions present themselves (DWR 2010b). These challenges include maintaining SWP delivery capabilities under continued manpower resource limitations, aging infrastructure constraints, and budgetary shortages. Challenges are also attributed to having a smaller, less experienced staff than comparable utilities due to severe recruitment and retention problems, ill-suited State contracting practices, and State hiring freezes (Torgersen 2012).”	DWR	Revise as follows: Although lesser known, an increasing challenge to Delta export reliability relates to the operations and maintenance of the large, complex facilities that make up the SWP. These challenges include maintaining SWP delivery capabilities under continued manpower resource limitations, aging infrastructure constraints , and budgetary shortages constraints in providing competitive employee compensation despite adequate SWP funding. Challenges are also attributed to having a smaller, less experienced staff than comparable utilities due to severe recruitment and retention problems, ill-suited State contracting practices, and State hiring freezes (Torgersen 2012). Further resource challenges are attributed to complex and cumbersome State contracting processes and State hiring freezes.

P. 93, line 43		The statement, "Were sufficient storage available, flows that exceed the instream flow criteria could be captured and stored," is perplexing. Does this statement refer to the 2010 Flow Criteria Report by the State Water Resources Control Board? The Flow Criteria Report's January-June recommendation of 75% of the unimpaired hydrograph on the Sacramento River would greatly limit the ability of existing reservoirs to capture high flows and store water. It is therefore unclear what benefit additional storage would provide. This recommendation is obviously inapplicable to agencies like the District that do not take any of their water supplies from the Delta. The recommendation should be modified to clarify that this recommendation applies only to agencies that take some portion of their water supplies from the Delta. The Mosquito Control BMP was updated in July 2012 by the California Department of Public Health in collaboration with MVCAC to promote mosquito control in California and enhance early detection of West Nile virus. In 2012, deaths nationwide from West Nile virus reached a high of 243. In California, 18 deaths and 471 total cases were reported last year. The BMP contains many effective tools for reducing the risk of mosquito-borne diseases, such as West Nile Virus. It provides guidance on how to work with local mosquito and vector control agencies to develop and implement site-specific Integrated Pest Management (IPM) strategies that maximize the efficacy of chemical control measures, decrease total pesticide use, and successfully reduce or eliminate breeding sites.	Mosquito and Vector Control Association of California	Original sentence: Restoration project proponents should coordinate with local mosquito abatement districts. Change to: Restoration project proponents should consult the California Department of Public Health's <i>Best Management Practices for Mosquito Control in California</i> .
