

SCIENCE NEEDS ASSESSMENT WORKSHOP

In the face of rapid environmental and climate change, it is time to look beyond our near-term efforts toward future science needs and opportunities in the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta and Suisun Marsh. Hosted by the Delta Plan Interagency Implementation Committee (DPIIC) and the Delta Independent Science Board (Delta ISB), this two-day virtual workshop will consider the physical, chemical, biological, and human processes, in addition to the infrastructure needed, to integrate and support efforts for developing a bolder Delta Science Strategy that maps out forward-looking science across the Delta science enterprise.

To help inform the science needs assessment, the update to the Science Action Agenda will help map out short-term science actions to fill knowledge gaps and identify management questions across the DPIIC agencies. Both short-term science actions (Science Action Agenda) and long-term science actions (Science Needs Assessment) are needed to address management concerns in light of rapid environmental change.

Join us to consider and discuss:

- What do we know now about future environmental change?
- What will future decisions-makers need to know?
- What science needs to be done today for decisions tomorrow?
- What needs to be done to create a science enterprise that can support a changing Delta and Suisun Marsh?
